Captain's Log

Merry Christmas from the Bridge.

The closure of the main Nelson highway and the repairs being undertaken to the storm damage on our access roads has meant the Bays have been quieter than usual. Hopefully the end is in sight with the main highway to Nelson scheduled to reopen just prior to Christmas. The major slips on the access roads to Tuna Bay and to the Duncan Bay launching ramp have had remedial work done on them to allow one way access but still require care when traversing.

The end section of the catwalk adjacent to the Duncan Bay launching ramp which suffered some damage at the seaward end during recent bad weather is still cordoned off. The Committee has been considering repair options but due to the amount of damage around the Sounds contractors are very busy. As the condition of the other parts of the catwalk have deteriorated we are looking at the feasibility of temporary repairs until any major renovations or replacement can be undertaken. A major refurbishment will take time due to consent requirements, engineering advice and funding.

Both our launching ramps at Duncan Bay and Penzance have a heavy coating of silt on the lower sections due to the amount of sediment in the Bays following the recent major land slips. This is making them extremely slippery and care is required when launching. We intend to have them both water blasted prior to the Christmas period. The swim platform at Duncan Bay is also to be reinstated before the holiday period.

A reminder again of the 5 knot rule within 200m of shore, especially close to our launching areas and swimming beaches. The Harbourmaster has provided us with additional signage and will be carrying out patrols over the summer period. They are especially concerned about the behaviour of jet ski operators throughout the Sounds.

Planning is well underway for our Annual Picnic Day on Monday 2nd January at The Betty Archer Reserve in Penzance. After COVID forced the cancellation of last year's event we are looking forward to dusting off our "Number Ones" and putting on another great family day.

It was moved at last year's AGM, that this year, the annual Boat Club subscription is to increase to \$70 plus a voluntary \$5 donation to the Rescue Helicopter. We have some serious maintenance work to be undertaken as previously noted and our costs are escalating. At \$70, our membership is still very good value for money when compared to other clubs.

A reminder of the Boat Club AGM which is scheduled for 4pm on Tuesday 27th December at Leanne Schmidt's place, 3163 Archers Road, Penzance.

News from the Helm

A summary of matters arising from the TIBC Committee meeting held on the 3rd December 2022

Financial Report:

Dave Wade tabled the draft Financial Statements for the year ended 31st October 2022. Year to date Income is \$14,423 which is down \$3,472 (-19.4%) on the previous year. The main variances were: Picnic Day income down \$3589; Advertising Income is down \$420; Membership income is down \$155; Merchandise income is up \$502; Donations are down \$418 on last year and Bank interest is up \$608.

Total YTD Gross profit is \$13,654 compared with \$15,566 last year.

Total Expenses are \$7,865 which is \$2,676 (25%) lower than last year. The main variances here are: Swimming Lesson Sponsorship -\$695; Fishing Competition -\$508; Ramps and Jetties -\$2,342; Office supplies -\$348 ; Accounting Services +\$850 and Depreciation +\$455.

The cash position remains strong at the end of October 2022 with a total of \$128,198 in cash across the various club accounts compared to \$124,855 at same time last year.

The YTD surplus is \$5,789 compared with \$5,025 (+15%) the same period last year. This is quite a good result considering no income from Picnic Day in 2022.

Total assets at end of October 2022 are \$133,071 compared with \$127,396 (+ 4.4%) at the end of October 2021.

Liabilities at the end of October 2022 are \$2,214 which are accrued Member Rescue Helicopter donations, accounting expenses and stationery invoices.

Net assets of the club at the end of October 2022 are \$130,857 v's \$125,067 (+ 4.6%) at the end of October 2021.



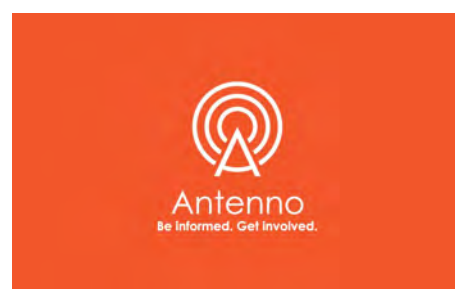
What's Happening in Our Bays

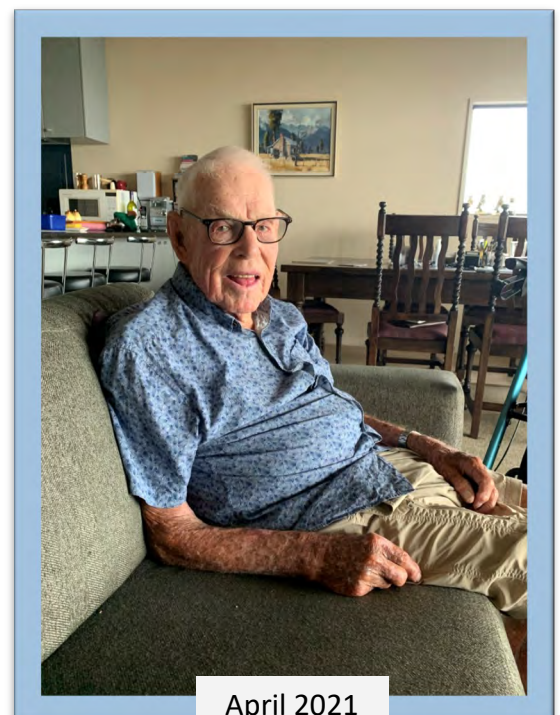

Safety at Sea

Last summer we had problems with jet skiers ignoring the 5 knot rules and excessive speed close to the shore and moored boats, especially in Penzance and Tuna Bay.

We have been in touch with the Harbourmaster regarding improved signage, more policing of our area by the Harbourmaster, and also having the 5 knot buoys in Penzance moved further out from their present location.

The 5 knot restriction applies out to 200 metres from the shoreline.

Tennyson Inlet Boat Club Committee Member, Pete Boyd, with 1 of a few 5 knot signs to be mounted in both Penzance and Duncan Bays. As a reminder to members to stick to this limit without 200m of the shore/structure, and 50m of another boat/swimmer/diver.

We recommend a quick refresh read of the rules clearly put by Maritime NZ. Less than a 2-minute read for a safe and happy boating season:

Rules on the water

It is your responsibility to know and understand the rules before heading out.

1. Listen and look ahead

You must keep a good lookout at all times.

It is your responsibility to stay alert for other boats, swimmers, dive boats, kayaks, hazards and obstacles. Keep focused on the water ahead, especially when travelling at speed.

2. Keep a safe speed

Travel at a safe speed, taking into account the boat traffic in the area, weather conditions and when visibility is limited.

You must not exceed a speed of 5 knots (a fast walking speed) if you are:

- within 200m of the shore
- within 200m of any structure
- within 200m of a boat displaying a diver's flag
- within 50m of any other boat
- within 50m of a person swimming
- on a power boat if any person has any part of their body outside the rails or edge of the deck.

You must be over 15 years old to operate any water craft capable of exceeding 10 knots, unless there is close supervision by an older person who is constantly within reach of the controls.

Always check the effect of your wake. You must not create a wake that causes unnecessary danger to other boats or people.

3. Respect the give way rules

When two boats are approaching each other, one has the right of way. The other boat must give way and pass astern (behind). To determine who has right of way, consider the vessel type:

4. Give way when overtaking

If you approach another vessel in a 135° sector at its stern, you are considered to be overtaking and must give way.

5. Keep clear of big ships

Keep clear from the bows and paths of larger vessels

Rural Connect

Connectivity Update—Governments New Remote Users Scheme (RUS)

This has been widely distributed by email, Marlborough District Council and social media.

The Remote Users Scheme (RUS) is focused on increasing the availability of broadband connectivity in rural and remote New Zealand. The first phase of RUS aims to provide a broadband internet service to an area by extending existing networks. Those still without coverage after this has been done, may be eligible to receive a one-off grant of up to \$2,000 towards set up and installation costs of a suitable broadband solution (e.g. Satellite)

Most of our members **will NOT** be eligible for the scheme because of the following exclusions:

- Areas that already have planned (RB12) coverage are excluded (for example Penzance, Tuna, and Duncan Bays)
- Baches are generally excluded (only principal residences are covered by the scheme)

Timings:

- Applications for the scheme are now open
- New broadband connectivity infrastructure for the eligible areas and households can begin being built in mid-2023
- Grants are available from mid-2023

However don't let the above stop you from applying if you wish. The more that apply the more attention the issues our area faces will be known by government.

Rural Connectivity Group Build Plan for Tennyson Inlet

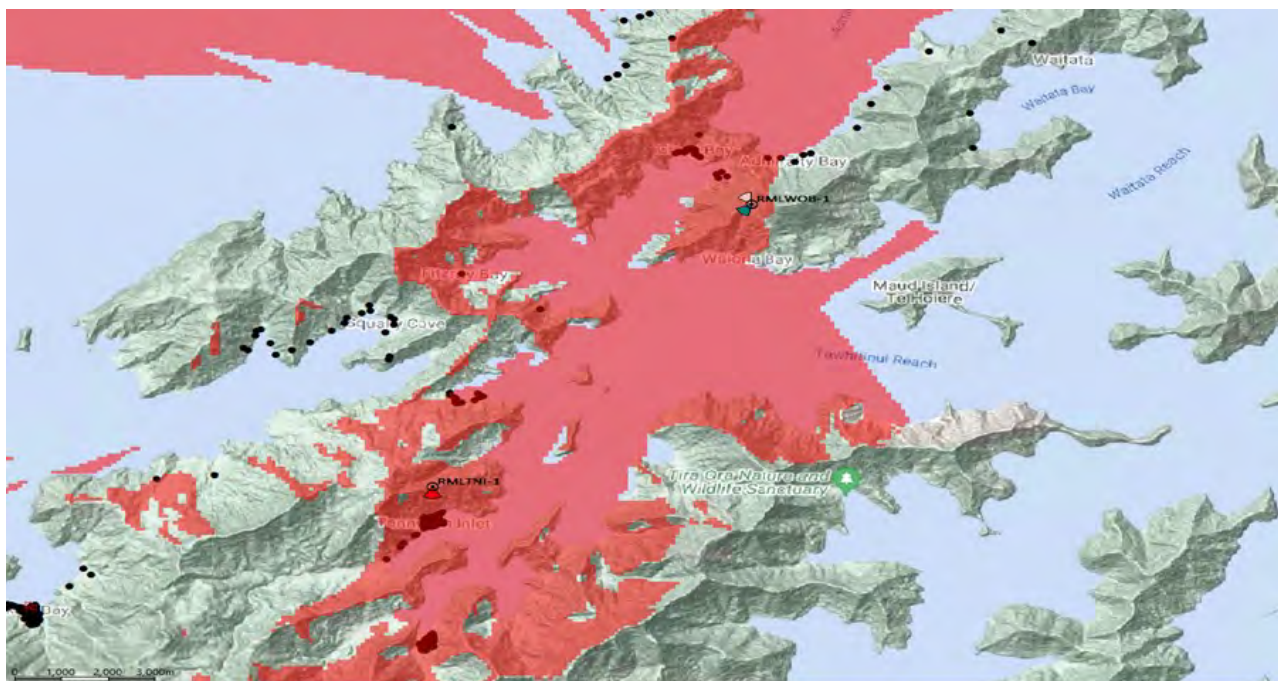
Tennyson Inlet and Waiona Bay Cell Sites 5th December 2022

The RCG was delayed with a start on the cell sites due to the ongoing access issues for both areas. As a result, the build crew were deployed to build other cell sites in the programme during November. However the build crew will commence on the Tennyson Inlet site during the second week of December and will then move on to the Waiona Bay cell site in January 2023. Once the build is completed network integration including the backhaul link will be established and tested with both cell sites scheduled to be live in February 2023.

Important information about this new 4G coverage

The RCG network is providing 4G wireless broadband and VoLTE mobile calling from Spark, Vodafone and 2degrees. To be able to use this coverage for voice services, there may be some things you'll need to do.

About this 4G RCG site

The RCG, a joint venture between Spark, Vodafone and 2degrees is aiming to build over 500 mobile sites to provide wireless broadband connectivity in rural areas. With this comes new 4G only mobile coverage in these areas. This work is part of the second phase of the Rural Broadband Initiative (RBI2) or funded through the Provincial Growth Fund.

To provide as much coverage as possible to kiwis across rural New Zealand, sites are mostly 4G only – because historically calls have worked over the 3G network, some mobile phones will not be able to make traditional voice calls whilst connected to a 4G only cell site. To use voice services in 4G only coverage areas, a VoLTE capable mobile phone is required.

What is VoLTE?

VoLTE, or voice over LTE (the technical name for 4G), is the next evolution of mobile calling that uses the 4G network for mobile voice calls. For the past decade, voice calls have been primarily carried out over the 3G network. So, while you may have a 4G capable phone and be able to see service bars on your phone, it might not be capable of voice calling over 4G. Most 4G capable phones however, can use data and SMS in these areas so apps such as WhatsApp and Skype can be used to make calls over data.

How can I get VoLTE?

VoLTE capable phones vary depending on which provider's network you are using. To find out whether your phone is VoLTE capable and how to enable it, visit:

What's in the Shed?

Derek & Mary Searle – 50+ years members of the Tennyson Inlet Boat Club and their boat, *Delamaro*, by Leanne Schmidt

In November I met with Derek & Mary Searle, of Woodlands in Tawhitinui Reach. They are 88 and 82 years old, with many friends and contacts throughout Pelorus Sound.

They first came to the area (Elaine Bay) in the 1960s towing both a caravan AND a boat, with Mary 8 months pregnant with their son, Lance.

Derek retired from being a Marine Refrigeration Engineer when he turned 70, but continues to get calls for assistance even though he is now 88 years old. Boats would come in from near and far for his expertise. There was many a grateful lady for getting the fridges going onboard with spoilable items a concern when at sea.

Mary has been an Accountant and on the former Power Board for our area.

Many boating adventures followed, with them purchasing their current property in the late 70's/early 80's.

The boat that features highly in their adventures is a Ryan Craft, built by Jack Ryan, called *Delamaro*. This is made up of family names: **Derek Lance Mary Rosemary**.

Delamaro, 8 metres long, was previously a search and rescue boat in Lyttleton Harbour. It won the first Nelson Offshore race with it's original V8 petrol engine. Back in those days petrol was 20c a gallon. Oh, for the days of that!

Derek and Mary used to get 4-5 drums (44 gallons each) to last them the summer. This was originally offloaded by Johnson's Barge service into the water and floated to shore. Then Johnsons weren't allowed to deliver this way so they trailered the drums in via their 4WD road from Te Towaka. The boat was then converted to LPG before finally landing on a Turbo diesel engine out of a Nissan Pathfinder.

Delamaro has a toilet, sink, portable cooker and can sleep 2 adults with 1-2 children.



Of their adventures....

They crossed to Wellington and Mana a few times in *Delamaro*. As well as Kaiteriteri, Picton and many other destinations. Often with Lance as a baby. Once coming out from The Brothers they hit a rip that had stuff flying out of cupboards and their pet Poodle going crazy.

Mary and Derek single-handedly taught the residents, and visitors to Elaine Bay at the time to water-ski. Hence all the fuel for summer. In 1961 they were towing 3-4 skiers and weren't quick enough to change the fuel tanks over. Everyone behind got a swim and then back up again.

For their honeymoon (prior *Delamaro*) they visited Stewart Island in a 14ft runabout. They used to tow this boat with a Mini 1000, with rocks in the boot to make it over the hills in Milford Sound. No one believed they'd achieved this and they got away with some apparent misdemeanours as a result.

White baiting trips out in the Sounds were facilitated by their dog rounding up the whitebait and, in one instance, having accidentally put diesel in the engine while out in the Sounds, ending up rowing from the Tennyson Islands to Brightlands Bay. There were finally back home in the middle of the night with the assistance of locals.

On that note, this story was made possible by [Te Hoiere Water Taxis](#), who provided transport for the visit.

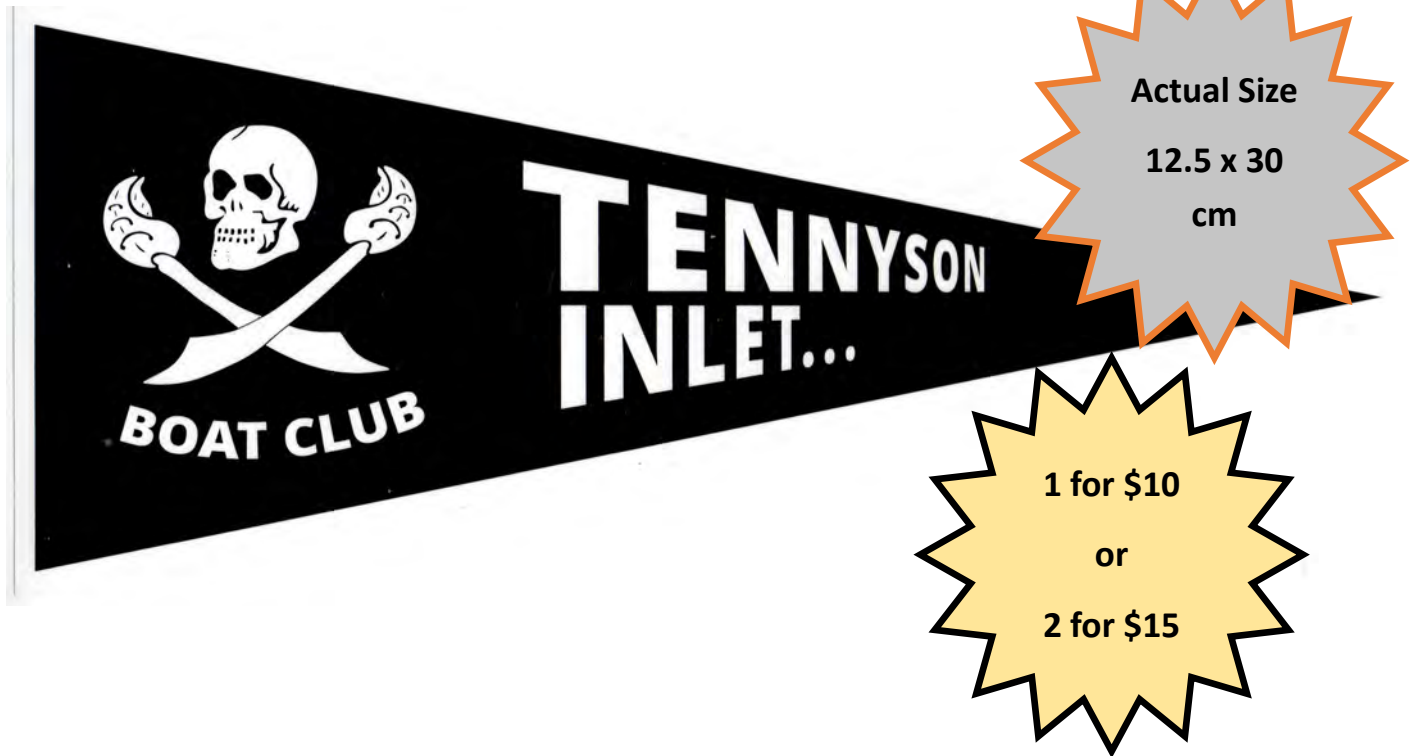
